NO.	BORDER	RISK TIER	WHY IT'S ON THE LIST
1	Pakistan and Afghanistan	Critical	Pakistan declared open war in Feb 2026; ceasefires keep collapsing.
2	Ethiopia and Eritrea (with Sudan)	Critical	Heavy fighting broke out Aug 1 to 3, 2026.
3	India and Pakistan (LoC)	Serious	Fragile ceasefire; both sides have tested missiles since 2025.
4	India and China (LAC)	Serious	Most sensitive standoff since the 2020 Galwan clash.
5	North and South Korea (DMZ)	Warning	First warning shots fired in over a year, August 2026.
6	Venezuela and Guyana (Essequibo)	Warning	A binding World Court ruling looms that one side has vowed to ignore.

EXCERPT FROM THE FULL REPORT

The top pick: Pakistan and Afghanistan

Of every border on this list, this is the only one where a government minister has used the words "open war." The immediate trigger is Pakistan's demand that Afghanistan's Taliban government crack down on the Pakistan Taliban (TTP), which has intensified attacks in Pakistan's border regions since re-establishing safe haven after the Taliban's 2021 return to power. Underneath that sits an older dispute: Afghanistan has never formally recognized the Durand Line, the border a British colonial administrator drew through Pashtun territory in 1893, as a legitimate international boundary.

A ceasefire brokered by Qatar and Turkiye in October 2025 held for a few months. It broke down on February 27, 2026, when Pakistan launched air strikes on Kabul, Paktia, and Kandahar; Pakistan's Defence Minister declared, "Our cup of patience has overflowed. Now it is open war between us and you." In the fighting that followed, Taliban forces reportedly captured and then destroyed a Pakistani military outpost in Shorabak district, Kandahar...

Casualty figures from this conflict are, unsurprisingly, disputed. Pakistan has claimed to have killed over 130 Taliban fighters in some engagements; the Taliban's own defense ministry has claimed single-digit losses while claiming to have killed dozens of Pakistani soldiers in return.
